## FROM THE PASTOR

**THIS SUNDAY WE** celebrate Pentecost Sunday, the third holiest day of the church year. We remember Jesus' promise to send the Holy Spirit and the fulfillment of that promise on the day the Spirit came upon the disciples. The Spirit is the third member of the Holy Trinity who is charged with creating the church.

We say it this way in our catechism "he calls, gathers, enlightens and makes holy the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one common, true faith. The Holy Spirit abundantly forgives all sins – mine and those of all believers. On the last day the Holy Spirit will raise me and all the dead and will give to me and all believers in Christ eternal life."

Think through each of those roles of the Spirit. He call us to faith. Scripture says no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. Faith is a gift of the Spirit. If you believe in Jesus, it is because the Holy Spirit has been calling you to faith. The Spirit also gathers us, compels us to meet with each other so that we aren't lone Christians but a church – a gathered group of Christians – growing in

community. The Holy Spirit enlightens us, reminds us of the teachings of Jesus and gives us new insight into what the scriptures mean and how to be disciples of Jesus. The Holy Spirit makes us holy. Sometimes I think of the Holy Spirit like Jiminy Cricket, the conscience of Pinocchio. When you get that small voice telling you not to make an immoral decision and urging you instead to do the right thing even when it's inconvenient or difficult, that is the Holy Spirit at work.

Part of our job as Christians, as Paul wrote to the Galatians, is to keep in step with the Spirit, to pay attention to what the Holy Spirit is doing in the world and how the Spirit is calling us to participate. We are to be filled with the Spirit and led by the Spirit. I'm just grateful that Jesus did not leave us orphaned but send this member for the Trinity to accompany us on this journey through life.

I wonder, what is the Spirit saying to you these days? Where is the Spirit leading you? Where is the Spirit leading us?

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# Sunday's Message

MAY 17, 2026

JOHN 17:1 – 11

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**I LOVE THIS** time of year. I want it to slow down and linger. The weather is amazing, not too hot, not too cold (except for tomorrow!) And even though it's "Maycember" with all the busyness of milestones, graduations and continuations, it still feels not too busy, not too stressful. Maybe June is even better than May. I love this time of year, too, because I get more time to spend with people, more time to do pastoral care visits, more time to play with my family, more time to vacation and see my friends.

This past Thursday we celebrated the ascension of Jesus, that moment when he slips the bounds of this world and returns to the Father from whence he came. Here at First Lutheran, we celebrate by getting together for meals and drinks. Pastor Michaela and I spent the day traveling from Monument to Cheyenne Mountain just to spend time with small groups of people for conversation. No other agenda than to be together, to deepen our knowledge of each other's lives. We ended the day around the fire pit here at church eating grilled brats and burgers, roasting marshmallows and singing around the campfire. The kids were running around playing ball on the lawn and people were spread under the porch and around the fire in conversation and laughter. The weather was perfect, it was glorious; it captured what I think of when I think of the church. It was about relationships and that is what this life is about. This is what Jesus reveals as we listen in with the disciples to him praying to the Father. Life is about relationships. He says to His Father and our Father as he anticipates his ascension and return to pre-incarnation life with God, "And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you

have sent." This is eternal life that we would know God, that we would know Jesus.

What have you been taught about salvation? That you have to be good? That you have to be obedient to God? That you have to repent of your sins? All of that is wonderful but it is not eternal life. Eternal life is to know God, to be in relationship with God. Jesus is modeling this for his disciples and us. He invites us to listen in as he does relationship with God. He invites us to be a fly on the wall in the room of the Trinity, that everlasting relationship of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Do you ever wonder what God talks about in the Triune relationship? Do you ever think about what it might be like to be in that conversation? Listen to Jesus, what he wants, what he tells the Father is that he wants to come back and be with the Father again like it was before the world existed. "So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed." He wants to revel in relationship, to sit around the fire with God, to enjoy the presence of the one He loves.

This is eternal life, friendship with God, enjoyment of the goodness of God. I just finished this great book by Arthur Brooks, *From Strength to Strength*. It's about moving into the second half of your life with intention and purpose knowing it will be different than the time of striving and building. I'm turning 50 this year so I'm pretty keyed into the idea that I'm moving into the second half of life. Brooks is a devout Christian and also studied under a Buddhist monk in India who taught him their understanding that life is divided into four stages of roughly 25 years each. The first 25 years you are a

student. The next 25 years you build your household and wealth. The third 25 years is a time of letting go of striving for success and making the turn to being a mentor to others, focusing on relationships, teaching and wisdom. All of this is in preparation for the last 25 years of life which is focused on worshipping God and transcendence.

I had a woman at Bible study years ago who has since died, but she once said to me around the table, “Pastor, you are just doing your job leading this study but the rest of us are preparing for our finals.” She was in that last stage of life preparing to go home to be with God. This fits quite well with Jesus’ prayer as he prepares to go to the cross, die, rise and return to the father in His Ascension. As we listen in on Jesus’ prayer, we see that his whole life flows out of his relationship with God. He was with God in beginning. Everything he taught the disciples, every word he gave them came from his relationship with God. And he is looking forward to returning to God, back in the glory they shared before time began.

Consider your own life. What goals do you have set for yourself? Where have you put your energy and focus? How does knowing that the end and purpose of this life shape that striving? If you know you are heading to life with God, shouldn’t you start preparing now? When you worship, when you pray, when you invest in relationships, when you care for others and love them, you are participating in the goal of life. These are the things of eternity; these are the things that will outlast all of the other things that clamor for our attention.

As Jesus continues in prayer, he begins to pray for his disciples. These men and women whom he has traveled with and taught and loved. Keep in mind that Jesus started talking in John Chapter 14 after washing his disciples’ feet and telling them he was going to leave them. Peter had asked him, “Lord where are you going?” Thomas had said to him, “Lord, we do not know where you are going, how can we know the way?” Phillip had said to him, “Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied.” The disciples are worried, and Jesus knows they are worried. He tries to comfort them, “Do not let your hearts be

troubled.” And here he lets them listen in as he prays for them. He asks the Father to protect these disciples he loves and to give them what he enjoys with the Father. Jesus prays, “And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you, Holy Father; protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one as we are one.”

We are still in this world as the disciples were. We have all the anxieties, all the distractions all the suffering that comes with this world. But take comfort that the God who made this universe, this cosmos, has you on his mind. As Pastor Michaela reminded us last week, we don’t have a “clockmaker” God who set this system up and walked away. We have a God who is praying for us: Jesus asking the Father to protect us and make us one as he and the Father are one, Jesus sending the Spirit to us so we can continue his mission in this world to invite all people into eternal life. Jesus asks the Father to protect the disciples and that word protect isn’t about keeping them from physical danger. And we know the disciples experienced the same suffering Jesus did at the hands of people opposed to God’s word. But what Jesus is praying for is that they would stay in relationship with God throughout the trials of this life. That when the suffering comes, when the anxieties mount, when distraction tempts, they would continue to believe in God and pray to the Father and abide in relationship. It’s a prayer for us, too, and I know it’s what we pray for others.

Today we celebrate our high school students who have graduated and marked a major milestone in their lives. But we also know that they are entering a time of their life that is dangerous to faith. They will be tempted by the world to abandon their belief in God, to shrink their understanding of this world to only what is material. They will be tempted to stop attending worship regularly. They may pause praying or reading scripture and loosen their hold on those practices that protect our faith. There will be other voices in their lives telling them that Christian faith is backwards or even harmful and encouraging them to abandon it while offering nothing better to replace

it. These fears we have for our students are similar to the concern Jesus had for his students. The disciples were likely not much older than high school graduates when Jesus sent them into a world that would threaten their faith. And we all live in the same world with similar threats and temptations. But we have a Savior who prays for us, who asks the Father to keep us in the faith. And in praying for us also shows us how to stay in relationship with God. Prayer is the way; time with God is the way; worship is the way.

I think of all the conversations I had at Beating the Bounds, all the stories we shared around food and drink and how that simple act strengthens bonds and protects relationship. As Jesus heads to the cross he prays a long prayer for his disciples to hear. He is showing us that we are to be a people in prayer. People who come to the Father and ask for unity with God, protection from the world, resources for our mission and purpose, and assurance that we will one day lay down the mission and the work and enter into the glory of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. So, in that Spirit I want to take some time and just do what Jesus did and pray for you (stand and hold hands?)

Father, here are your people whom you love, who I love and seek to serve. You know what is going on their lives more than I do. Some of them are suffering from illness, cancers and diseases that hurt them and treatments and medicine that promise relief but also come with painful side effects. Some of them are fighting demons of depression, loneliness and addiction. Father, some of your people are going through divorce, others are fighting for their marriages. Many of your people are worried about their kids and grandkids, unsure how to help them to believe in you. You know their grief and the losses that burden their hearts. I want you to heal them all, to relieve them of all suffering and pain. But more than that Father, I ask that you give them support from one another, that you unify this church in love so that they ask for help from each other and are quick to offer it. I pray that you strengthen their faith that in times of difficulty they would turn to you and gain strength from your love for them. Father, you have promised

us that we are yours, and you will come and bring us to yourself. Fill every person who hears this prayer with strong faith in that promise. I pray that everything they do would come from their friendship with you, would come from their knowing and loving you. I pray with Paul that they would know the height and depth and length and width of your love. That they would know that whatever they face they are not alone, you are with them and we are with them. That we are one church, one body in Christ, united by your spirit to serve each other in tender love. Lord, they are in this world, and they need you to keep them in the faith. Protect them, fill them with your Spirit and through their faith bring encouragement and hope and salvation to others. They are yours Father, and they are mine, and I am theirs and we belong to each other and to you. Hear our prayer, bind us together, and be with us to the end. In Jesus' name. Amen

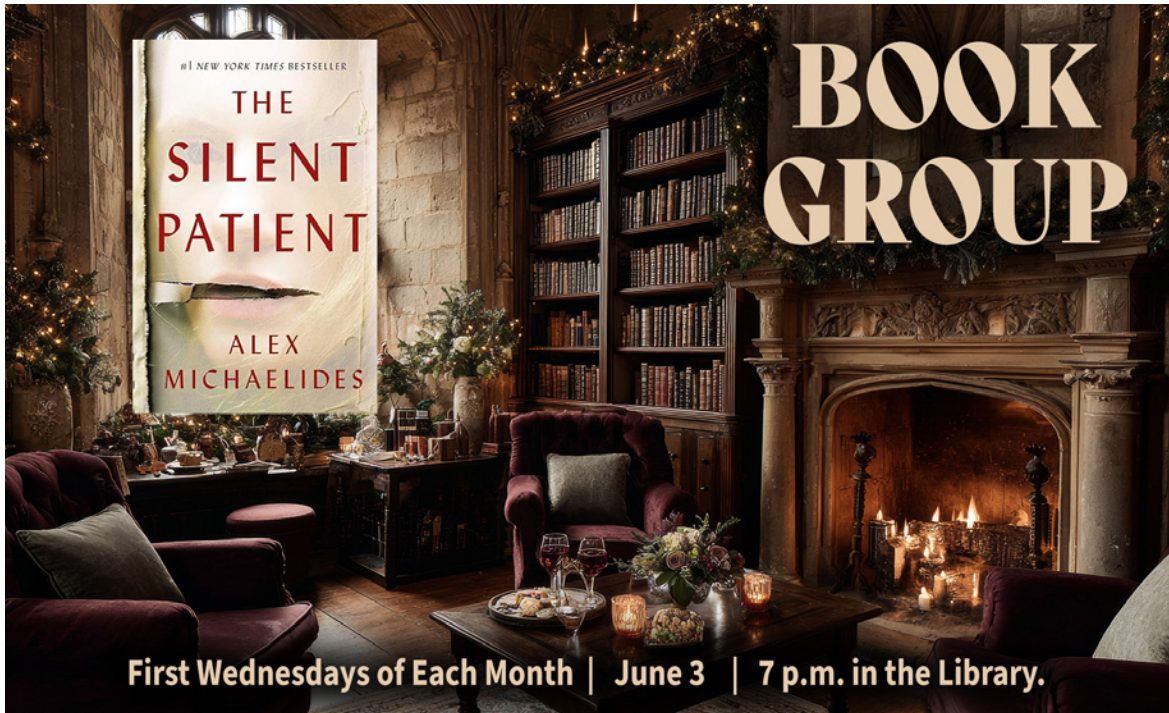

## THE EMMAUS WAY

He is risen! Alleluia!

We will be between Ascension Day and Pentecost when you read this, but I did not want to leave the incredible Ascension of Jesus unaddressed. As you probably know by now, picturing something visually helps me grasp spiritual concepts, and I’m going to use a rather strange image today to talk about the Ascension; please stick with me.

Snuba, in case you don’t know, is a way of underwater diving that is a hybrid of snorkeling and scuba. Instead of carrying a tank of air on your back, a long hose connects your breathing regulator to air tanks on a boat on the surface of the

water, allowing you to survive in and interact with a foreign environment.

“What in the world does snuba have to do with the Ascension?” I hear you ask. Well...

In the Incarnation, Jesus became human and descended from heaven (the “surface” in this metaphor) to

earth (“under the water”)—laying the snuba line between heaven and earth—where he lived as one of us. His ascension after his death and resurrection sent him back to “the surface,” where he then turned on the airflow of the Spirit to us on Pentecost. It is this continually-flowing life of the Spirit that enables us to continue living “under the water” (now foreigners and strangers here; Hebrews 11:13) as we wait for Jesus’ return to “accomplish the final marriage between heaven and earth.”

I know this metaphor is a stretch, but I still love it. It can help us remember that while our true home is now the Kingdom – up above the water on the “surface” – we continue living here, under the water, to spread that Kingdom life to others. In other words, the point isn’t to escape this world but to bring the beautiful life and way of the Kingdom down into it. But our Source – the only way we can continue to live the Kingdom here – is the continual life – giving Breath of the Spirit, sent to us by the Father and the Son, emanating from a place wholly other.

How does this metaphor strike you? Whether it’s illuminating or eye-roll-inducing, let’s continue to “swim” together as we anticipate once again the coming of that life – giving Spirit on Pentecost!

# Worship and Study
